FOUR TANTALISING PAIRINGS IN LAST STEP ON GOLDEN ROAD TO COLOGNE

The Machineseeker EHF Champions
League 2023/24 threw off seven months
ago with 16 teams on the starting grid.
After 14 intense rounds of the group
phase followed by the captivating playoffs, only eight clubs can still dream of
lifting the coveted trophy this season.

Which teams *dare to rise* to the occasion in crunch time?

The last step on the Golden Road to Cologne are the quarter-finals, with the opening leg to be played on 24/25 April and the all-decisive return leg on 1/2 May. The eight matches will determine the quartet that advances to the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 2024 at LANXESS arena on 8/9 June.

The stunning quality of the quarter-final lineup guarantees handball fans worldwide of two midweeks full of excitement and drama. Five (former) titleholders are still in the mix, while the three other teams have played the EHF Champions League final at least once in the past. It is really game on!

Two teams that are yet to win their first title meet when Telekom Veszprém HC take on Aalborg Håndbold in a hard-to-predict Hungarian-Danish clash.

Record champions Barça hope to get back onto the throne after two years, but the Spanish side will need to get past Paris Saint-Germain Handball, who aim to finally realise their trophy ambitions. A second French side is still in the running, as two-time champions Montpellier HB face four-time titleholders THW Kiel for a ticket to Cologne.

Germany also has a second team still in the race, as defending champions SC Magdeburg are set to meet Industria Kielce again, a rematch of last season's final. This duel will be the highlighted Match of the Week in the first leg.

The race to the most coveted trophy in men's club handball has now reached its business end. Enjoy the quarter-finals!



All eight quarter-finalists this season have played in an EHF Champions League final in the past; five of them have actually lifted the trophy, most of them on multiple occasions. The eight teams represent six different countries, as Germany and France are both left with two contenders in the mix.

sustainable trophy, designed in 2020 and showing the moment a ball hits the net, is the prize the eight teams left in the 2023/24 competition are playing for.

- 1 play-off match was attended by more than 10,000 fans: 15,600 spectators came to watch HC Zagreb against Montpellier HB a record attendance so far for the 2023/24 season.
- 1 of the eight play-off matches ended in a draw: Zagreb vs Montpellier 27:27; the following week, the French side won the return leg 30:24.

- 1 team only managed to defend their trophy since the implementation of the EHF FINAL4 format in 2010, when Barça beat Aalborg Håndbold to the 2021 title and Industria Kielce the following year.
- 1 winner at the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne has lifted the trophy both as player and coach: Filip Jicha, in 2010 and 2012 as player and in 2020 as coach – and each time with THW Kiel.
- 2 players can win their fifth EHF Champions League title: Aitor Ariño and Gonzalo Pérez de Vargas (both Barça); Nikola Karabatic (Paris Saint-Germain HB) and Ludovic Fabregas (Telekom Veszprém HC) are three-time winners with their former clubs.
- 4 (all) EHF FINAL4 2023 participants are still in the race this season: SC Magdeburg, Kielce, Barça, and PSG.

of the eight coaches still in competition have won the EHF Champions League as players: Talant Dujshebaev, Momir Ilic, Filip Jicha, and Bennet Wiegert.

- 5 (former) EHF Champions League winners, with 19 trophies in total, are part of the quarter-finals: Barça (10), Kiel (four), Magdeburg, Montpellier (two each), and Kielce (one).
- **5** goals was the smallest aggregate winning margin in the four play-offs ties: PSG beat Orlen Wisla Plock 64:59.
- 5 times only since the implementation in 2010 have the titleholders qualified for the EHF FINAL4 the next year: Barça in 2012, 2022, and 2023; Kiel in 2013; and Vardar in 2018.

6

countries are represented in the quarterfinals: France, Germany (with two teams each), Denmark, Hungary, Poland, and Spain (with one team each).

- 6 coaches of the eight teams still in competition have won the EHF Champions League as coaches: Carlos Ortega (coach of Barça/won with Barça), Talant Dujshebaev (Kielce/Ciudad Real and Kielce), Filip Jicha (Kiel/Kiel), Patrice Canayer (Montpellier/Montpellier), Bennet Wiegert (Magdeburg/Magdeburg), and Raul Gonzalez (PSG/Vardar).
- 6 of the eight quarter-finalists also reached this stage of the competition last season.

8

goals was the biggest winning margin in a play-off match, when Kielce beat GOG 33:25; Veszprém defeated OTP Bank - Pick Szeged by seven goals twice.

- 8 (all) quarter-finalists have played at the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne at least once in the past.
- 9 matches so far this season ended in a draw: eight in the group phase, one in the play-offs.
- 10 times have record champions Barça won the EHF Champions League: in 1995-2000, 2011, 2015, 2021, and 2022.

11 matches this season, including Veszprém vs Szeged in the play-offs, featured 70 or more goals.

12

matches long is the unbeaten streak
of Magdeburg, who started the group phase
with two defeats but have won
all their matches since.

14 goals was the biggest aggregate winning margin in the play-offs, when Veszprém beat Szeged 76:62; 13 goals was the margin between Kielce and GOG, 66:53.

15

goals were scored in the play-offs by PSG line player Kamil Syprzak, who leads the top scorer standings going into the quarter-finals.

39 of the 120 matches so far this season have been attended by 5,000 or more fans; four of those matches took place in the play-offs.











- **57** of the 120 matches before the quarter-finals featured 60 or more goals.
- 67 matches were won by the home team; 44 times, the visitors took both points.
- 72 was the highest number of goals in a play-off match, when Veszprém beat Szeged 39:32; 78 is the highest number for the season and also involves Veszprém, who beat FC Porto 44:34.
- **100** goals scored by Kamil Syprzak make the PSG line player the top scorer of the competition before the quarter-finals; the next player who is still in competition is Barça's Dika Mem with 82.
- **488** goals were scored in the eight play-off matches, an average of 61 per game.
- **7,098** goals have been scored since the start of the group phase, including 6,610 in the 112 group matches an average of 59.15 goals per match.
- **15,200** spectators at Zagreb vs Montpellier in the first leg of the play-offs made for the highest attendance figure at a match so far this season; this mark will be passed at the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 at LANXESS arena in Cologne in June.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS

All matches shall be played in accordance with the IHF's current Rules of the Game. Variations on a technical level are possible. All matches of the play-offs and the quarter-finals shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

PLAY-OFF AND QUARTER-FINALS

If, after completion of the two matches, both clubs have won the same number of points (no overtime will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) goal difference
- b) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- > Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws
- > The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.
- > The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.
- > If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued

- until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- > In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- > Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.
- > Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.
- > While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.
- > If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

- qualified for the quarter-finals by beating GOG in the play-offs by 13 goals (66:53) on aggregate
- in the group phase, they finished fourth in group A, with 16 points (six wins, four draws and four losses)
- played the last two EHF Champions League finals, but lost to Barça and SC Magdeburg, respectively
- did win the EHF Champions League trophy when they played their first final in 2016, beating Veszprém
- coach Talant Dujshebaev is the second most successful coach in EHF Champions League history, with four trophies (2006, 2008, 2009, and 2016)
- their leading scorer in the competition, Alex Dujshebaev, has scored 64 goals so far this season



- qualified directly for the quarter-finals after overtaking leaders Barça in the last round of the group phase to win group B
- during the group phase, they managed to beat Barça at home and Veszprém away to secure the top spot
- last season, they beat Kielce in the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 final 30:29 after overtime; that is the only time the two clubs met in an official match before the 2023/24 quarter-finals
- are playing their sixth season in Europe's top flight; they won the title twice in their previous five appearances
- also won the EHF European League in 2021, as well as the EHF Cup three times
- their best scorer so far has been Ómar Ingi Magnússon, who netted 75 times in the group phase



- > the 2016 champions played their third EHF FINAL4 final in June 2023, but lost 30:29 after overtime against SC Magdeburg
- > this defeat was Kielce's second straight loss in an EHF Champions League final, after falling to Barça the year before
- > qualified for the 2023/24 edition as Polish champions, winning the domestic title for the 12th time in a row and 20th overall
- > celebrated the biggest win of all eight play-off matches when they defeated GOG by eight goals (33:25) in the first leg
- > one player from the 'golden' squad from 2016 is still playing for Kielce: right back Pawel Paczkowski
